CHUNG-YUN DAVID CHANG has been appointed Chinese Cataloguer at Gest Oriental Library, Princeton University. Dr. Chang will begin working on July 1, 1981. In addition to an M.L.S. from Queens College, he has both an M.A. and a Ph.D. in Asian History from St. John's University, New York City. Dr. Chang is currently working as Project Cataloger at the East Asian Library of Columbia University and is now completing courses at Columbia in advanced librarianship with a specialization in technical services.

HUEI-JU (POLLY) CHANG has joined the East Asian Collection, Yale University Library, as Catalog Librarian, effective May 18, 1981. Previously, she worked in the Catalog Department of Iowa State University, at the Knoxville Business College, and in the Gest Oriental Library and East Asian Collections of Princeton University. Mrs. Chang has a B.A. degree in History from the National Taiwan University and an M.L.S. degree from the University of Tennessee.

MIN-CHIH CHOU has been appointed Chinese Bibliographer and Cataloger, Gest Oriental Library, and East Asian Collections, Princeton University, effective October 27, 1980. Mr. Chou has an M.A. degree in library science from the University of Michigan, an M.A. in history from the University of Oregon, and a Ph.D. in history from the University of Michigan. In 1974-1975, he was Visiting Assistant Professor of History at Michigan State University. In 1975, he was Assistant Professor of History at Central Michigan University. From 1976-1978, he was at Antioch College in Ohio as Assistant Professor of Asian Studies. In 1980, Mr. Chou worked as a librarian at the Public Library of Columbus and Franklin County in Ohio.

KEY K. KOBAYASHI, Area Specialist of the Japanese Section, Asian Division, Library of Congress, retired effective January 10, 1981, after 34 years of Government service.

Mr. Kobayashi received the B.A. degree from the University of California at Berkeley in 1950 with a major in Political Science. Subsequently he received a Master's degree in International Affairs from Columbia University and a certificate from the East Asian Institute of Columbia University in Japanese studies in 1956.

He entered the U.S. Army in 1944; was graduated from the U.S. Military Intelligence Service Language School at Fort Snelling, Minnesota; and served with the Allied Translator and Interpreter Service in Manila and Tokyo, and with the U.S. Army Air Corps in South Korea, before his discharge in 1948. In 1951 he was recalled to active duty and served as U.S. 8th Army Military Intelligence Liaison Officer to IInd ROK Corps in Korea, and later as U.S. Army Liaison Officer to the Japanese police in Yokohama, before his discharge in 1954 as 1st Lieutenant.

From 1956 to 1961, he was a research analyst, first with the Department of State and subsequently with the Central Intelligence Agency. In 1962 he became the first Japanese linguist on the staff of the Scientific Library of the U.S. Patent Office; and while serving there he wrote an article entitled "On Japanese patent literature" for the Patent, Trademark, and Copyright Journal of Research and Education, vol. 7, no.2 (Summer 1963).

In June 1965, he joined the staff of the Library of Congress. During his more than 15 years in the Library he was very active in selecting and preparing Japanese material for the Library's Preservation Program; in collection development; and in the assignment of categories for cataloging. He produced many translations in response to Congressional requests; and he was extremely active in assisting readers and in giving effective reference service. He also served as Orientalia Division representative to the Reference Department Human Relations Committee and the Reference Round Table. Mr. Kobayashi was listed in the Bicentennial edition (1976-77) of A Who's Who of the Commonwealth's Community Leaders, published in Williamsburg, Virginia.
