Contributors to This Issue

Jim Iversen is Professor Emeritus of Aerospace Engineering at Iowa State University and President of the Board of Directors of Danish American Heritage Society. He has translated several works including a short story by Johannes V. Knudsen published in Vol. 26, No. 2 (2003) of *The Bridge*. In 2000 he translated *Danneborg on the American Prairie* by Torben Grøngaard Jeppesen.

Borge M. Christensen was born in Odense, Denmark, in 1928 and emigrated to the United States in 1956. A retired General Electric engineer and business executive, he resides in Tucson and is a past member of the Board of Directors of the Danish American Heritage Society and currently serves on the board of The Danish Immigrant Museum. His previous contributions appeared in *The Bridge* in 1997, 2001 and 2003. With his wife, Lotte, he co-authored *Our Last Frontiers: A World Cruise Diary* (2000).

Thorvald Hansen retired as Professor of History and Director of the Danish Immigrant Archive—Grand View College. A frequent contributor to *The Bridge*, he is the editor of *Church and Life* which is published by the Danish Interest Conference. Among the several books he has written is *That All Good Seed Strike Root: A Centennial History of Grand View College*, published in 1996.

Kristian Hvidt served from 1964 until his retirement in 1999 as librarian and then protocol secretary of the Danish Parliament. His 1972 doctoral dissertation, which appeared in English in 1975 under the title of *Flight to America: The Social Background of 300,000 Danish Emigrants*, is a classic work on migration history.

John Robert Christianson is Research Professor of History at Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, and past editor of *The Bridge*. He has written or edited nine books including a biography of the Danish astronomer, Tycho Brahe (1546-1602), that is reviewed in this issue. The recipient of grant from the National Bank of Denmark, he is spending the current academic year in Copenhagen continuing his research on Tycho Brahe

David S. Iversen is Cataloging Librarian at the Gordon B. Olson Library at Minot State University in Minot, North Dakota. He holds an undergraduate degree from Dana College and advanced degrees

from the University of Iowa and the University of Wisconsin. His translations of several short stories by Carl Hansen appeared in *The Bridge* Vol. 17, No. 2 (1994).

Otto Brask was born and reared in Denmark. He emigrated to the United States in 1953 and has resided in Seattle since 1959. He is a retired instrument maker at the University of Washington. Over the years he has developed an interest in Danish-born homesteaders in the Pacific Northwest.

H. Arnold Barton is Professor Emeritus of History at Southern Illinois University, Carbondale. The author of several works on Swedish emigration to the United States, he was editor of the *Swedish-American Historical Journal* from 1974 to 1990.
