### About the Authors:

*Dr. sc.agr. Ernst W. Alther*, who has traveled widely in the United States and has visited the country repeatedly not only for genealogical research but also professionally, is a citizen of St. Gallen, Switzerland. He served as President of the Swiss Genealogical Society from 1958 to 1962, is one of its honorary members, and is Honorary President of its St. Gallen section. In 1998 he was awarded the medal of the International Confederation of Genealogy in Turin, Italy. Until 1995 he served as editor of the *Jahrbuch der Schweizerischen Gesellschaft für Familienforschung*. In 1999 he was awarded the Prize of Appreciation [Anerkennungspreis] of the St. Gallische Kulturstiftung [Cultural Foundation of St. Gallen]. His engagement in genealogy is wide-ranging, and he has also lectured at the University of St. Gallen on protection of soils and the environment. *Dr. Tadeusz Debski* grew up in Poland and during most of World War Two was captive in a concentration camp in Germany.
