He has served as a member of the Advisory Board and First Vice President of the Swiss American Historical Society that published his book *Swiss Festivals in North America: A Resource Guide* (1999) and his biography of *Leo Lesquereux, the Arduous Path of a Nineteenth Century Natural Scientist* (2006). A founding member of the Swiss Center of North America (New Glarus, Wisconsin), he serves as an Honorary Director of the Board of Directors.
