From the Editors: Submittals

The *Comparative Civilizations Review* publishes analytical studies and interpretive essays primarily concerned with (1) the comparison of whole civilizations, (2) the development of theories and methods especially useful in comparative civilizational studies, (3) accounts of intercivilizational contacts, and (4) significant issues in the humanities or social sciences studied from a comparative civilizational perspective.

By “a comparative civilizational perspective” we mean (1) the use of evidence from more than one civilization (the various national traditions of the modern West being regarded, in this respect, as constituents of a single civilization) and (2) a method likely to throw new light either on the origins, processes, or structures of civilizations or on the problems of interpreting civilizations.

This is a peer-reviewed journal. Please submit your paper in Rich Text format as an email attachment for the reviewers’ consideration. Be sure to include on your paper itself your email address and your academic affiliation and position, or note that you are an “independent scholar.” Send your paper to Professor Walter Benesch at ffwjb@uaf.edu.

Illustrations are encouraged. They should be 300 dpi and sized no more than 4 inches wide and 5.5 inches tall (to accommodate captions). Illustrations must be submitted as individual files in their native format (that is, in the format in which they were created) separate from the text. You are encouraged to contact the technical editor prior to generating your illustrations to maximize their impact.
