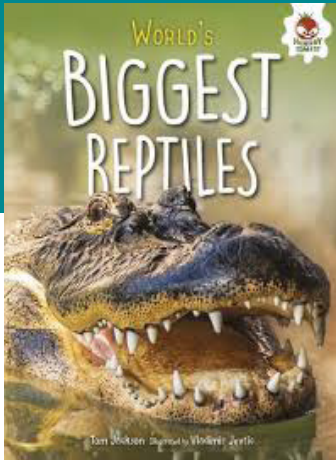

In this book, readers will learn fascinating details about the largest reptiles found on earth. Author Tom Jackson and illustrator Vladimir Jevtic combine real photographs with comic strip-style illustrations.
