

Absolutely Everything is a fascinating history book that covers billions of years. This book will teach you about the solar system, animals, ancient civilizations, important historical figures, and more. The book begins with important historical events all the way from the formation of Earth up to the present day. The book is organized in a timeline, with each of the fifteen chapters covering anywhere from a few million years to a few hundred years. Each chapter also has a general theme.

Absolutely Everything has a colorful cover and a fun approach to sharing history. There are lots of pictures, and the information is presented in a useful and logical way. This would be a fun book to have in a classroom or at home to supplement home school or day-to-day learning. Each chapter starts with a colored background and a basic timeline of the biggest events. This color is used on the side of each page in the chapter for easy reference. It also gives the book a fun, encyclopedia-like feel. Although there are lots of pictures, there is also a ton of text which, at times, makes the book feel cumbersome and more like a textbook.
