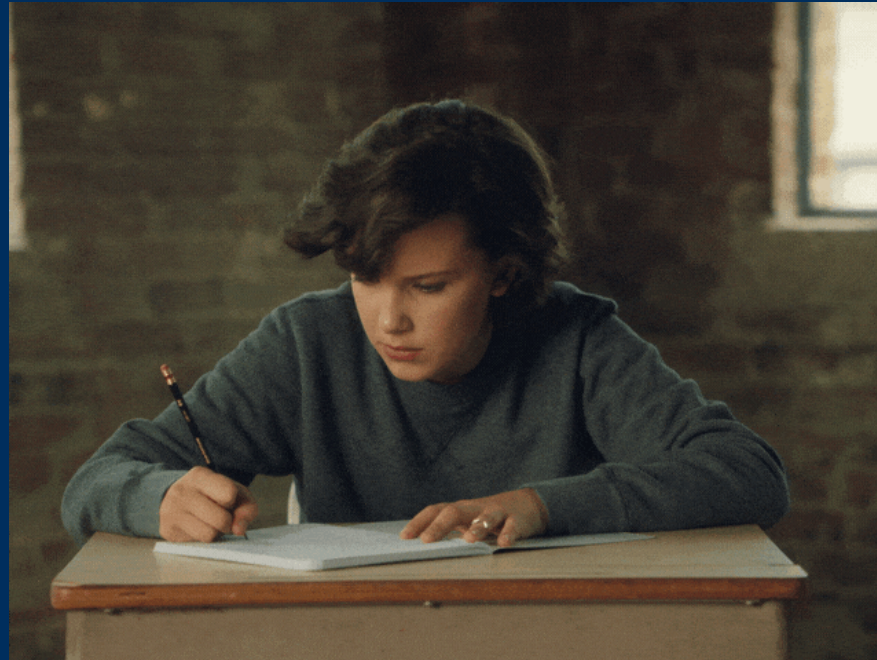

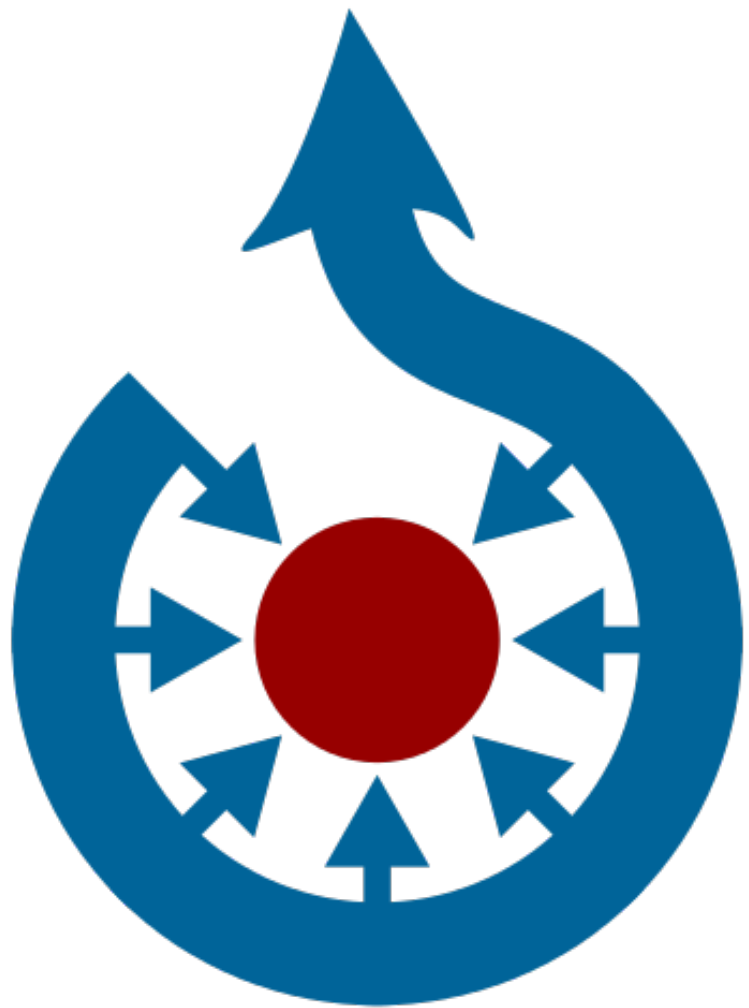

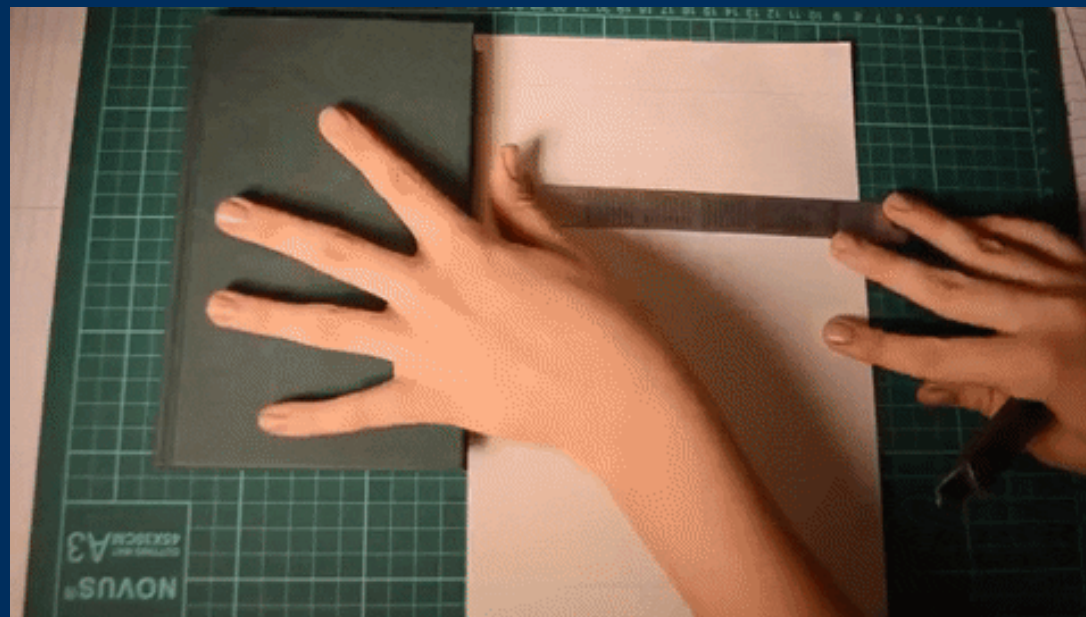

Mildred Dilling (February 23, 1894 – December 30, 1982) was an American **harpist**. She studied under **Henriette Renié** in Paris. She first started performing in 1911, and traveled over 30,000 miles (48,000 km) per year at her busiest.^[1] She performed with many notable vocalists, had her own weekly **NBC** radio show, and appeared on the **Bing Crosby** radio show. She toured Europe and Asia multiple times, and often performed internationally. She enthusiastically championed the harp^[1] and gave many celebrities their first harp lesson, including **Harpo Marx**. In 1962 she helped found the **American Harp Society**. She devised a lever system for a non-pedal harp that made it more portable than a pedal harp but which allowed flexibility in harp tuning. Her extensive harp collection is held partially by **Indiana University**, and harp students still use two of her harp music compilations.

Early life [edit | edit source]

Mildred Dilling's mother, Rachel Freel, grew up on a farm and once heard travelling musicians play the harp and violin. Freel was so taken with the music that she was determined that her future children would learn to play the violin and harp.^[2] Freel married Frank Dilling^[2] and Mildred was born on February 23, 1894, in **Marion, Indiana**.^[3] Dilling had a younger sister, Charlene. As there was no harp instruction available in Marion, Mildred studied the piano starting at age six while Charlene studied the violin. Mildred's instructor was Samuel Nussbaum at the Marion Conservatory of Music. The family moved to Indianapolis, where Mildred studied harp with Louise Schellschmidt at age 12.^[1] Upon receiving a harp for her 12th birthday, she was so excited that she "had to lie down for several minutes".^[2] At age 13, she started playing for social events, her first fee for a performance being a dozen carnations and a jar of pickles.^[1]



The Tetons and Jackson Hole have been the setting for a number of films, including [John Wayne's](#) film acting debut in *The Big Trail* in 1930 and the western film classic *Shane* in 1953.^[5] Mount Moran and the surrounding mountains were used as a backdrop for the lake/swamp setting in the original television series *Land of the Lost*. In addition, this mountain range is shown on the cover of rapper [Kanye West's](#) eighth studio album *Ye*.^[6]

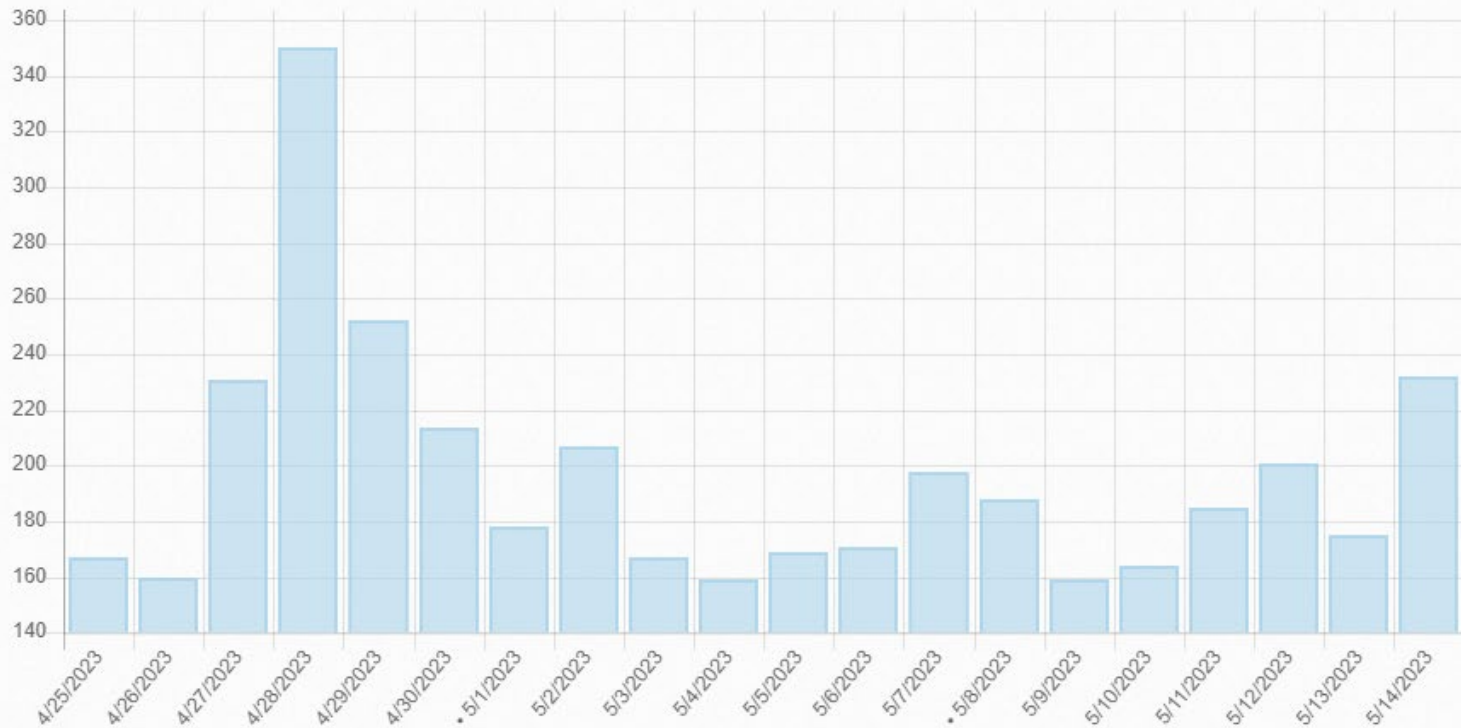

The **sophic and mantic** were originally defined by [Hugh Nibley](#) in 1963 as a way of describing naturalistic and supernaturalistic [ontologies](#). [H. Curtis Wright](#), a professor in the [Brigham Young University \(BYU\) Library information science](#) program, popularized the distinction and several [Latter-day Saint \(LDS\)](#) scholars referenced it, mostly in the 1990s. Wright wrote that while mantic approaches include sophic knowledge, sophic approaches exclude mantic knowledge.

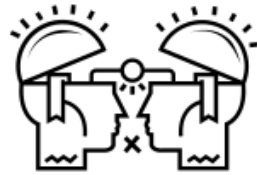

Wikipedian-in-Residence at a public library!

- Kim Gile at the Kansas City Public Library received \$50,000 in grant money from W.T. Kemper Foundation to hire a Wikipedian-in-Residence (the library paid the remaining amount, ~\$7,000).

The Kansas City Public Library claims that Miranda Pratt is "the first Wikipedian-In-Residence appointed by a public library in the United States."

Miranda Pratt is taking up the mantle of Wikipedian-In-Residence for the Kansas City Public Library.

Pratt's position within the library is that of an advocate – tasked with increasing engagement and understanding in Kansas City surrounding the free online encyclopedia Wikipedia.org.

"With this position, I'm kind of creating community awareness that we can all write our history together on Wikipedia," Pratt said in an interview with KCUR's Up To Date.

Although the Kansas City Public Library calls this position the "the first Wikipedian-In-Residence appointed by a public library in the United States," there are other institutions that house similar positions.

The Darfur Stoves Project seeks to protect Darfuri women by providing them with specially developed stoves which require less firewood, hence decreasing women's exposure to violence while collecting firewood and their need to trade food rations for fuel.^[5] The stoves were developed with input from the women who would use them, enabling the designers to ensure that they would not tip over and that they would cook at an appropriate heat.^[21]



Octavia Estelle Butler (June 22, 1947 – February 24, 2006) was an American science fiction author and a multiple recipient of the Hugo and Nebula awards. In 1995, Butler became the first science-fiction writer to receive a MacArthur Fellowship. Born in Pasadena, California, Butler was raised by her widowed mother. Extremely shy as a child, Butler found an outlet at the library reading fantasy, and in writing. She began writing science fiction as a teenager. She attended community college during the Black Power movement, and while participating in a local writer's workshop, was encouraged to attend the Clarion Workshop, which focused on science fiction. She soon sold her first stories and by the late 1970s had become sufficiently successful as an author that she was able to pursue writing full-time. Her books and short stories drew the favorable attention of the public and awards soon followed. She also taught writer's workshops, and eventually relocated to Washington. Butler died of a stroke at the age of 58. Her papers are held in the research collection of the Huntington Library.
